

# 634 Plagiarism Collusion and Cheating Policy

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## **Purpose**

1. To provide guidelines to apply to the prevention, detection and management of plagiarism, collusion and cheating.

## **Policy**

2. CCG expects students to act with integrity and honesty in learning and assessment and respect for the work of others. Acts of plagiarism are completely unacceptable and will not be tolerated. Contravention of this policy will result in students being penalised as per the Student code of conduct and the Student Disciplinary Procedures.
3. Plagiarism involves using the work of another person and presenting it as one's own. Students are required to acknowledge the intellectual property of others used in the preparation of projects and assessment tasks.
4. Plagiarism is the copying of another person's ideas or expressions without appropriate acknowledgement and presenting these ideas or forms of expression as your own. It includes not only written works such as books or journals, but data or images that may be presented in tables, diagrams, designs, plans, photographs, film, music, formulae, web sites and computer programs.
5. The penalty of plagiarism, collusion and cheating will depend on the severity of case, whether the student is a repeat offender, whether there is evidence of deliberate deceit and whether another student has been coerced into participating in the plagiarism.
6. All students are fully informed of plagiarism, collusion and cheating through the Student Handbook, the Student Assessment Guide and by the Teacher/Trainer. Students are directed on the possible outcomes of committing plagiarism, collusion and cheating.
7. All allegations of plagiarism, collusion and cheating will be investigated transparently.

## **Definitions**

9. Plagiarism – is to take someone's words, ideas or other materials and present them as your own.
10. Collusion – is an understanding or agreement between two or more people to intentionally cooperate and gain an unfair advantage in assessment and may include unauthorised and unacknowledged joint authorship in an assessment task, unauthorised and unacknowledged copying or use of material prepared by another person for use in assessment
11. Cheating - is to seek to obtain an unfair advantage in an Assessment.
