Wood pledges \$2.2m for Bunyip upgrade

Federal La Trobe MP Jason Wood announced that a Coalition Government will commit \$2.25 million towards major upgrades at Bunyip Recreation Reserve, ensuring the facility can continue to support local sporting clubs and the broader community.

The oval hosts 330 players training and competing each week and the current facilities are struggling to meet demand.

Mr Wood said the investment will deliver a much-needed oval upgrade, modern LED lighting, and brand-new social rooms—providing a safe, sustainable, and inclusive space for local athletes, supporters, and community groups.

"This investment will transform Bunyip Recreation Reserve into a first-class facility for players, families, and the broader community," Mr Wood said.

"Upgrading the oval, installing LED lighting, and building new social rooms will ensure the reserve can continue to be a sporting hub for

years to come."

This upgrade plans to deliver a new playing surface and improved drainage system to prevent flooding and maintain a high-quality field year-round. It will replace outdated halogen lights to improve safety, cut energy costs by 50%, and provide a more environmentally friendly solution.

There would be the construction of new social rooms to replace the existing, ageing club-house built in 1976.

This \$2.25 million commitment is dependent on the Coalition forming Government in the upcoming 2025 election to be held no later than May this year.

Outcomes from the Convention will be incorporated into a Communique that will be presented to the President of the Senate, Senator The Hon Sue Lines, for tabling in Parliament and recorded in Hansard.

As a national delegate Alexia Davitt will travel with 24 other students from their state.

Other elements of the program will include the Prime Minister's Welcome Reception at Parliament House, a meeting with Governor-General Sam Mostyn AC at Government House, and an official dinner at the National Press Club.

In another pledge for the upcoming federal election, La Trobe MP Jason Wood has promised \$237,500 for the Cardinia Storm Hockey Club.

The funding would go to lighting and facilities at the club's ground.
